The beginning of the summer will, hopefully, allow most of you to relax a bit before everything moves into high gear in the fall. And now that school is over the children are out and about more than usual, biking, skateboarding or just running around. It often seems as though kids have a way of appearing seemingly out of nowhere so it's important to exercise more caution than usual while driving around the town. We hope that parents or guardians will also insist that while driving, no one uses their cell phone, either to talk or text. It has been statistically proven that even if you have a hands-free mobile phone, you ARE distracted if driving and talking. Although most Americans believe that talking on the phone and texting are the most dangerous behaviors behind the wheel, 81 percent of drivers admit to making phone calls while driving. It's particularly important to impress on your teenager, who is more than likely a relatively new driver, the dangers inherent in this behavior.

This is the time of the year when many of us scale back a bit from work and try to make time to just enjoy a change of pace. What doesn't change, regardless of the season, is the need to feed the hungry in our state and closer to home, right here in Piscataway. Summer months are

In each of our libraries, J. F. Kennedy and Johanna Westergard, there is an ongoing food collection and I urge you to include in your grocery shopping some items to be brought to either library. Please check the expiration dates before you donate and only canned or packaged items are requested.

This is an exciting time as we improve, enlarge and enhance our Senior Citizen Center. Due to the work involved, the Center will be closed for approximately six months, reopening in November. Once the improvements are completed, the existing space will increase by several thousand square feet and will truly be a state of the art facility, not only in Middlesex County but in the state of New Jersey. Among many changes, the addition of a separate computer lab means that no longer will computer space be shared with an all-purpose room and more seniors can learn and use the computers. And since the Senior Center is the Township's major designated emergency site, there will be a new storage area where all the cots, blankets and other Office of Emergency Management equipment will be close on hand in the event of an emergency. Before this improvement the emergency equipment was scattered here and there in the Township. Our senior population is a significant and integral part of what makes Piscataway a great place to live. Once the Senior Center is up and running again we will have a grand celebration. Our seniors deserve no less!

Congratulations to our library director, James Keebler, who was honored at the New Jersey Library Association (NJLA) Annual Conference as Librarian of the Year, a very prestigious honor. Throughout the three days of the Conference it was noted that people in

attendance were very impressed with what Piscataway Library is doing. James said that NJLA does not have a Library of the Year award but if they did, Piscataway Library, hands down, would win that award. ..... *New Jersey's Natural Treasures*

Summer is in the air. The sun is shining, the trees and flowers are in full bloom and vacation time is approaching for almost everyone. As you know, New Jersey is a state that is rich in history and natural beauty. There are many natural treasures available for residents and visitors of New Jersey to take advantage of in the Garden State.

The preservation of these treasures has been a part of the legacy of the Green Acres Program for over 50 years. The Green Acres Program was established in 1961 and has become a national model for open space preservation. This program has preserved over 650,000 acres of open space and provided hundreds of parks and outdoor recreational facilities in every county.

In Middlesex County, 800 acres of the historical Middlesex Encampment Site in Monroe Township was purchased jointly by Middlesex County, with the assistance of Green Acres Local Funding Program and the Green Acres State Acquisition Program. This property was the encampment site of Washington's army the night before they marched into the Battle of Monmouth.

Moreover, these investments yield economic, environmental and health benefits to our community. A 2009 study by the Trust for Public Land found that every \$1 invested in state land preservation programs returns \$10 in economic value through nature's services, such as flood control and filtering air and water of pollutants. The average home value increases 16% when it located within 1,500 feet of natural areas. Wildlife-related tourism is estimated to generate about \$3 billion of gross economic activity annually, representing about \$1 billion of wage and salary income annually or about 37,000 jobs. For every 10% increase in forest cover, water treatment and chemical costs decrease by 20%. New Jersey's open spaces support approximately 900 wildlife species. Access to parks has also proven to lead to a 25% increase in people exercising three or more times per week.

This year, if you have not already joined last year's 19 million visitors, take your vacation and celebrate 50 years of the Green Acres Program by taking advantage of some or all of the various events and natural resources available to you. You have 39 State Parks, 11 Forests, 50 Historic sites and 121 Wildlife Management Areas to choose from. METLAR/BODINE HOUSE MUSEUM (CIRCA 1728)

Piscataway Historical & Cultural Museum – 1281 River Road – PO Box 141 – 732-463-8363

Reminder: the museum IS open monthly on the 2nd Saturday and 3rd Sunday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. On those days visitors should enter the site via the front, ground floor gift shop entrance. Arrangements to visit, by appointment, can be made by calling the museum (732-463-8363) and leaving a contact name and telephone number. Arrangements will gladly be scheduled at a mutually convenient time.

As is widely known, the July 17, 2003 fire severely damaged the Metlar/Bodine House Museum, a National and New Jersey State Registered Historic Site. In the fall of 2010, the museum reopened to the public on a limited basis; this restriction is due to the fact that neither the current entrance nor the museum’s only restroom, located on the 2nd floor, is handicap accessible. Beginning this summer, construction on a new museum entrance will address both of these problems, finally allowing the museum’s doors to be open on a regular schedule. The current roof, repaired in 2005, has major installation problems and will be rebuilt, funded by the NJ Department of Environmental Protection. An exhibit of the extensive map collection, illustrating the theme “From Indian Trail to Interstate,” is being mounted in the first and second floor hallways, and exhibit development projects, emphasizing Piscataway’s 346-year history, will begin in earnest this fall.

Picnic Reservations for Possumtown Park are available to Piscataway residents, civic organizations and businesses based in Piscataway from May 7 through September 9, 2012. All picnic requests must be made in person in the Recreation Office at least two weeks before the actual date of the picnic. Office hours are Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Documentation verifying Piscataway residency is required.

Open Gym Program for Piscataway residents currently in grades 9 – 12, will be held at Piscataway High School in the 11/12 gym from Monday through Friday - 3 p.m. to 8 p.m. Proof of residency is required for admission. The program starts on July 2 and ends August 17, 2012.

Tennis Court Reservation System allows residents, 18 years and older, to reserve a tennis court at Columbus Park for one hour per day, Monday – Friday – between 5:30 p.m. – 9:30 p.m. Court reservations are not required for weekends and all other weekday hours and are operated on a first-come, first-serve basis. In order to make a court reservation you must first register, in person, in the Township Recreation Department to obtain a “Tennis Identification Card.” There is no charge for the I.D. card or to reserve a court. Proof of Piscataway residency is required.

After obtaining an I.D. card, registration can be made by calling the Recreation Office at 732-562-2382 between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. only.

- **Recycling Trash Center coupons and Recycling Center ID passes and rules and regulations have been mailed to all residential owners.** The 2012 Coupon MUST BE PRESENTED AT THE GATE, along with Driver's License as Proof of Residency.
- Coupons ARE required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials. Coupons are NOT required for disposal of recyclable material, including batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, metal (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners) and all recyclables picked up curbside. **NOT ACCEPTABLE:** PAINT, HAZARDOUS WASTE, KITCHEN GARBAGE, CONTRACTOR DEBRIS, DIRT/ROCKS/STONES. No consumer electronics accepted.
- Residents entering the Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered in Piscataway. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick up truck. **NO COMMERCIAL VEHICLES OR TRUCKS WITH SIDE BOARDS ARE PERMITTED AND NO BOXED U-HAULS OR MOVING TRUCKS ARE PERMITTED. PICK UP TRUCKS REQUIRES TWO (2) COUPONS.**
- **GRASS DISPOSAL COUPONS.** Each bag of grass, leaves, bagged brush, and vegetation being dropped off at the Mini Dump is required to have a GRASS DISPOSAL COUPON. COUPONS are available for purchase @ \$1.00/per coupon – MINIMUM PURCHASE TWO (2) COUPONS. Coupons may be purchased in the TAX OFFICE (Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.), or by mail. Send SASE and check, made out to: TAX OFFICE, 455 Hoes Lane, Piscataway, NJ 08854. **NOTE:** Coupons are valid only for the year of purchase. There are no refunds.
- Televisions, VCRs, Computers, Printers, Monitors may be brought to the Recycling Center.

The Piscataway Township Domestic Violence Crisis Intervention Team (PTDVCIT) is looking for volunteers to expand its membership. The Team is a volunteer organization that assists victims of domestic violence in accordance with NJ law. The Team is comprised of paraprofessional volunteers, trained and certified in domestic violence counseling, under the guidance of the Piscataway Police Department. The Team has been in existence since 1995, and has assisted over 1100 families in a time of crisis. Their purpose is to provide a range of aid, comfort, education, assistance, and referrals to victims of domestic violence and to increase public awareness through education of individuals, groups, and the community.

Anyone who wishes to volunteer is required to complete an application. A criminal background check as well as an electronic fingerprint submission will be conducted.

Senior Programs Continue Unabated

Due to the Senior Center renovation the facility is closed for a period of six months and will reopen sometime in November. Many of the programs and events have been temporarily moved to different venues and will continue unabated. MEALS ON WHEELS. The Meals on Wheels program has not been affected by the closing of the Township Senior Center. Meals are being delivered to our residents through the South Plainfield Senior Center. Eligibility for the program is determined solely by medical need with no financial requirements or means testing. A formal application must be completed so that medical needs can be verified. Eligibility is re-evaluated every six months. A senior citizen, caregiver, friend, or healthcare provider can initiate the call to request Meals on Wheels. However, the service cannot start until the client agrees to accept Meals on Wheels. If a person does not want meals delivered, then meals cannot be delivered despite the fact that the person would probably benefit if meals were accepted. It is not an entitlement program; persons of every income level can receive home delivered meals. For information, call the Senior Citizen Center at 732-562-1133.

Piscataway residents can join **NIXLE** for free. **NIXLE** is a community emergency alert system that allows residents to receive important notification from the Police Department on issues such as power outages, water main breaks, large traffic accidents, road closings or other important police activity via cell phone (text message) or e-mail. **NIXLE** provides communities throughout the country with news and information that is both proximate and personally relevant. STERLING VILLAGE, Piscataway's low and moderate income senior residency is made up of 150 apartments throughout five floors. The facility allows residents to maintain independent living, close to family and friends. It is adjacent to the Piscataway Senior Center and the J. F. Kennedy Library. There are many amenities and activities available in a friendly family-like setting. To apply, you must be at least 62 years of age and meet income eligibility guidelines as established by COAH.

Low income applicants cannot exceed \$35,700/per year for a one-person household; \$40,800/per year for a two-person household. Moderate income applicants cannot exceed \$57,120/per year for a one-person household; \$65,280/per year for a two-person household. Rent structure: starting at one bedroom-low: \$834; one bedroom-moderate: \$994; two bedroom-low: \$918; two bedroom-moderate: \$1,174. Rents include all utilities and garbage. Building tours are offered Monday-Friday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. by appointment only. If interested, call 732-699-0033.

The Rutgers University Board of Governors has created a special program, Senior Citizen Audit Program, to permit retired NJ residents, age 62 or older, to attend courses on a space-available, noncredit basis.
