



MAYOR'S MESSAGE

"What we learned from Hurricane Sandy..."

The weather experts have recently announced that hurricane season is here again (June – November). And while they are not presently predicting a storm like Sandy, let's remember they didn't predict that storm either until it was too late for many. As we have said before, no one could have imagined the destruction that Hurricane Sandy would bring to the state of New Jersey. It was initially called just a "simple tropical storm" and as we now know it wound up being anything but "simple". And while parts of New Jersey, particularly our shore areas, were literally in the eye of the storm, Piscataway, nevertheless, suffered tremendous and costly damage in our community. Thousands and thousands of trees fell during the height of the storm, many blocking roads and downing power lines. The state of New Jersey, as well as Piscataway, continues to be concerned with the utilities' response to these power outages and we can only hope that major improvements are on the horizon. We remember also the thousands of residents in our community who were without power for some as long as 11 days. The frustration of so many of our residents who endured the freezing cold and dark nights cannot be underestimated. Thinking ahead several years ago, although never anticipating a storm of Sandy's magnitude, all of our municipal buildings had backup generators in place

so that our government, in any kind of an emergency, could continue to function, and we did. The storm's economic impact, figures recently released, is estimated to be \$36.9 billion. As a result, municipalities across the state are facing budget and property tax challenges that make it very difficult for revenues to match expenses. We remain grateful, however, that Piscataway suffered no deaths or serious injuries as a result of this monstrous storm.

We have recently compiled some data on how we handled the storm and what we learned in order to be better prepared in the event of something as unexpected as a hurricane with the force of a Sandy.

- Piscataway's Office of Emergency Management (OEM) began preparing for a storm a week or so before Hurricane Sandy hit; they met continuously for three days from the day the storm made landfall and they continued to meet daily for the next two weeks. The OEM staff continues their regular monthly meetings in order to strategize and prepare for the unknown and unexpected.
- The Mayor, police chief, fire official and others filmed daily updates that were shown on our public access station (PVTV); these updates were also available on the Township Web site. Residents can also sign up for free NIXLE service whereby messages are sent directly to one's cell phone. (www.nixle.com)
- Thousands of downed trees, flooding and downed utility poles resulted in more than 80% of our residents without power, ranging from 24-hours to as long as 11 days.
- The Township distributed 10,000 bottles of water and 1,500 meals.
- As a result of the storm and its aftermath, volunteer fire companies and rescue squads responded to over 200 calls.
- The Library and Senior Center extended their hours to serve as warming centers for those without heat; they also served as charging stations for those without power.
- The Department of Public Works (DPW), along with outside contractors continue to work on stump removal as well as debris collection and debris disposal. To date, approximately 25,000 tons of debris has been

removed.

- A total of \$2,620,648.87 in hurricane-related expenses has been submitted to FEMA for reimbursement. However, the final cost to the Township will likely reach close to \$5,000,000 million dollars. How much of these costs will be reimbursed is unknown. The costs included staff for public works, outside contractors, police, fire prevention and construction code and repair and includes ongoing repairs and debris removal and disposal from Township property.

With anything as unexpected as the size and destruction of this particular storm, there are lessons to be learned. First and foremost is the fact that our COMMUNITY IS RESILIENT. We really are "Jersey Strong"! We also know that you can never prepare too much because you can never really know what the unexpected will bring. Having additional money in the budget, which goes into surplus if not used in the current year, is important. Communication and cooperation is essential and the key to full recovery.

Sharing all these lessons and more should make it a little easier the next time we are called on to weather a situation or storm for which there is no guidebook.

It has been nine months since Hurricane Sandy and many residents have yet to clear the storm debris from their property. I remind them that the debris must be removed before October or Code Enforcement will be forced to issue a summons. (continued on page 3)

RIVERSIDE PARK - Rededicated & Drug Awareness Community Day

As a result of the devastation caused by Hurricane Irene in August 2011, unimaginable havoc and destruction took place at Riverside Park. Riverside Park is one of the Township's 26 parks and is located along the Raritan River on River Road. The hurricane sent water over the roof of the main building and the pavilions which caused catastrophic structural damage to all the structures in the park. Through federal funding, Community Development Block Grant (CDGB), Riverside Park was rebuilt and rededicated in June 2013. The Municipal Alliance Substance Abuse Task Force-D.A.R.E. Community Day program celebrated four hundred fifth graders, graduates of the D.A.R.E. program, at this event. During the day there was a range of activities to choose from including Helicopter and fatal-vision-goggle demos, bike stunts, M.C. Blue the recycling robot, horse and pony rides, games, face painting and more. And in partnership with the Middlesex County Improvement Authority (MCIA), "Days of Fun on the Raritan River", Stone Skipping 101, was offered as a part of the Riverside Park program.

Riverside Park and Possumtown Park are available to Piscataway residents (proof of residency is required) and civic organizations and businesses based in the Township from May 18, 2013 to September 22, 2013. All requests must be made in person in the Recreation Department office at least two weeks prior to the actual date of the park event. Office hours are Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 4:20 p.m. Note: All 2013 weekends at Riverside Park are fully booked.

PISCATAWAY ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

For those of you who have noticed roadway construction while driving in and about Piscataway, listed below are some of the projects completed or underway.

HIGHLAND AVENUE

A project to reconstruct the entire length of Highland Avenue from River Road to Witherspoon Street is scheduled to be completed early summer 2013. The construction consists of full depth paving with a new 5-inch base course and 2-inch of surface course between Witherspoon Street and Deborah Drive, and 2-inch mill and overlay between Deborah Drive and River Road, as well as Belgium block curbs and sidewalks along one side of Highland Avenue.

WILLIAM STREET IMPROVEMENTS – Phase III

William Street between Vogel Avenue and New Market Road is being reconstructed and resurfaced, including improvements to curbs, drainage, driveway aprons, sidewalks and handicap ramps. This project, funded by a \$250,000.00 grant from the New Jersey Department of Transportation, is scheduled to be completed by the fall of 2013. The road will be closed to thru traffic until completion. A detour will be in place to direct traffic around the project.

WYCKOFF AVENUE – PHASE III – (Complete)

The Wyckoff Avenue, phase III project reconstruction between Crestwood Street and Brentwood Drive is complete. This was the final phase of the street improvements the Township has been working on for the last four years.

DRAKE LANE AND OAK PLACE

Improvements on Drake Lane and Oak Place will begin in the summer of 2013. The improvements along Drake Lane-Phase I will consist of full depth paving between Lake Park Drive and Wood Lake Drive. In anticipation of this roadway project, the Township completed the installation of Belgium block curbs and sidewalks. This section of the road will be closed to thru traffic; it will be strictly for emergency purposes. The reconstruction of Oak Place includes full depth pavement, curbs, drainage improvements and sidewalks.

The following Township streets are on the road concrete and paving program and barring unforeseen circumstances such as a significant rise in oil prices or utility issues should be completed in 2013-2014. They include Adrian Avenue (to End), Mansfield Road (11th Street), 10th Street (Pelham Avenue), Van Winkle Place (Sherwood Drive), Apple Way (Cul De Sac), Brandywine Circle (Academy Street), Dial Avenue (Academy Street), High Street (Fairview Avenue), Joyce Drive (Cul De Sac), Kilmer Court (Dead End), Lafayette Street (Fairview Avenue), Maple Avenue (Winans Avenue), Nelson Place (Winans Avenue), Putnam Avenue (Academy Street), Strawberry Lane (Apple Way), Cypress Court (Cul De Sac), Day Avenue (Kossuth Terrace), Hamilton Blvd., (Cul De Sac), Jasmine Drive (Cul De Sac), Lee Place (Dead End), Lodge Street (Dunn Avenue), Magnolia Court (Cul De Sac), May Court (Cul De Sac), Wildwood Drive ((Dead End), Bound Brook Avenue (Hudson Street), Deborah Drive (Park Avenue), Deerfield Avenue (Overbrook Road), Dey Street (Runyon Avenue), Ellis Parkway (Custer Street), Emerson Street (Lincoln Avenue), Foster Street (Westfield Avenue), Hillside Avenue (Dead End), Ivy Street (Dead End), Kent Street (Cul De Sac), Martin Lane (Dey Street), Shirley Parkway (Custer Street), Arlington Place (Freedom Avenue), Charles Terrace (New Durham Road), Commonwealth Avenue (Dead End), Meredith Road (House #27 & 30), and Ryan Lane (Haines Avenue).

Covered under the agreement are: animal nuisance complaint investigations and inquiries; investigation of animal bites; quarantining and releasing animals involved in bites; picking up injured/dead animals; picking up stray animals; transportation of injured animals to animal hospital; cruelty to animals complaint investigations; arrange for transportation of specimens to State Health Department Laboratory for rabies testing and enforcement of ordinances/laws relating to animal control.

- Recycling Trash Center coupons and Recycling Center ID passes and rules and regulations have been mailed to all residential owners. The 2013 Coupon MUST BE PRESENTED AT THE GATE, along with Driver's License as Proof of Residency.
- Coupons ARE required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials. Coupons are NOT required for disposal of recyclable material, including batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, metal (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners) and all recyclables picked up curbside. Also accepted: televisions, VCRs, computers, printers, monitors. NOT ACCEPTABLE: PAINT, HAZARDOUS WASTE, KITCHEN GARBAGE, CONTRACTOR DEBRIS, DIRT/ROCKS/STONES.
- GRASS DISPOSAL COUPONS. Each bag of grass, leaves, bagged brush, and vegetation being dropped off at the Mini Dump requires residents to have a GRASS DISPOSAL COUPON. COUPONS are available for purchase @ \$1.00 per coupon – MINIMUM PURCHASE TWO (2) COUPONS. Coupons are available for purchase in the Tax Office (Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 4:20 p.m.) or by mail. Send a SASE and check made payable to: Piscataway Tax Office. Send to PISCATAWAY MUNICIPAL TAX OFFICE, 455 Hoes Lane, Piscataway, NJ 08854. COUPONS ARE VALID ONLY FOR THE YEAR OF PURCHASE. There are no refunds.
- Residents entering the Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered in Piscataway. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick up truck. NO COMMERCIAL VEHICLES OR TRUCKS WITH SIDE BOARDS ARE PERMITTED AND NO BOXED U-HAULS OR MOVING TRUCKS ARE PERMITTED. PICK UP TRUCKS REQUIRE TWO (2) COUPONS.
- CURBSIDE TRASH/BRUSH PICKUP BY APPOINTMENT: Homeowners may schedule two (2) trash pickups, and one(1) branch pickup from January to the middle of October. To schedule a curbside pickup, call DPW @ 732-562-2390.
