

## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

### "NO CHILD SHOULD GO TO BED HUNGRY"

According to the spring 2011 edition of Community Food Bank of New Jersey, Feeding America, the nation's largest domestic hunger-relief organization, released a landmark study, "Map the Meal Gap," looking at the food budget needs by families struggling with hunger in New Jersey each year. According to the report, an approximation of the meals missing from the people at risk of hunger in New Jersey would take \$445 million to provide those missing meals! That equals out to 12.6% of our state's population who are in need. The number of children the Feeding America network serves throughout the country has increased by 50 percent since 2006, and in 2010, 14 million children and nearly 3 million seniors are served annually by the Feeding America network. One of the many ancillary issues of children going to school hungry shows, in study after study, that their performance in school is adversely affected by their not having a proper diet. We aren't living in a third world country where you might be able to understand such a situation, but in a state such as ours, where by all accounts, we have the second-highest income in the United States, it is difficult to get your head around the fact that seniors, children, the unemployed, and the working poor are going hungry in our midst. Perhaps even neighbors of yours and mine go to bed hungry.

I bring this subject up now because summer months are traditionally more difficult times for those in need of food. Many food distribution centers find their shelves are depleted quicker than at other times of the year. So what can we do? In each of our libraries, J. F. Kennedy and Westergard, there is an ongoing food collection. I would ask that when you grocery shop you include some items to be brought to either library. The Middlesex County Food Organization (MCFOODS) picks up the food and it is distributed throughout the county as well as to our local F.I.S.H. organization. Only canned and packaged goods are requested and please check expiration dates before you buy or donate food items. Someone, somewhere, some child, will be thanking you for your generosity.

On another note, a majority of the 566 municipalities in New Jersey have pledged their participation to a Mayors Wellness Campaign.

The mission of the Mayors Wellness Campaign is to develop and implement active-living initiatives with the ultimate goal of improving health and reducing the skyrocketing health care costs that come with the obesity problem in New Jersey and elsewhere. Piscataway has been signed on since the inception of this project, and in October 2010, Councilwoman Michele Lombardi organized the "Biggest Loser Piscataway" campaign with over 200 residents participating and, ultimately, over 300 pounds left the Township for parts unknown. In the spring, over 1000 free pedometers, donated by Johnson and Johnson Healthcare, were offered to residents in the hope that the pedometers would encourage people to make walking a part of daily life since it is, by far, the most accessible form of exercise for everyone regardless of age. All 1000 pedometers were given out so I hope this indicates that more and more of our residents are walking.

Piscataway's July 4th celebration and extraordinary fireworks display is scheduled for Monday, July 4th (rain date July 5th) at the Piscataway High School football stadium. Beginning at 7 p.m. there will be clowns, kiddie rides, live music and a classic car show; the fireworks will begin at approximately 9:30 p.m. No pets are allowed in the stadium. We invite all our residents to come out and enjoy this

annual event. And don't forget to bring a chair and a blanket to the Thursday summer concert series in Columbus Park beginning on July 14th at 7 p.m. It's a wonderful way to spend a relaxing and music filled summer evening close to home. 

Coupons are **NOT** required for disposal of recyclable materials, including batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, metal (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners and all recyclables picked up curbside. **NOT ACCEPTABLE: PAINT, HAZARDOUS WASTE, KITCHEN GARBAGE, CONTRACTOR DEBRIS, DIRT/ROCKS/STONES.** No consumer electronics accepted.

## *N* Enjoy the Summer from Sandy Hook to Cape May

New Jersey's 130 miles of coastline are home to a wide variety of activities that I encourage all Piscataway residents to enjoy this summer. From Sandy Hook to Cape May, New Jersey's beaches boast an exciting array of fun for the entire family. Whether you prefer the entertainment culture of Point Pleasant, Seaside Heights, Ocean City, and Wildwood's boardwalks with rides and amusements, or quieter settings to enjoy swimming, surfing, fishing, and sun bathing, the shore has something for everyone.

An activity I recommend for people of all ages is a trip to one of our eleven historic lighthouses that are open to the public. The Cape May Lighthouse offers its visitors a spectacular view of the Cape May peninsula, as well as a history lesson of the Delaware Bay harbor defense system, used in World War II. As a National Historic District, Cape May is also home to the Emlen Physick Estate, Victorian B&Bs and the pedestrian friendly Washington Street Mall.

Barnegat Light has been directing fishing vessels and recreational boats into the Barnegat Bay for decades. An ecological treasure in New Jersey, Barnegat Bay's unique ecosystem is home to one of the northern most points of the Intracoastal Waterway, which stretching from the Manasquan River to the Florida Keys. Barnegat

Bay generates \$3.4 billion of revenue every year in recreation and tourism for the State of New Jersey, while employing tens of thousands of New Jersey residents.

Unfortunately, years of mistreatment and abuse of the Bay are leading to its demise. Last summer a package of bills were approved by the Senate Environment and Energy Committee and the Assembly Environment and Solid Waste Committee to establish several new environmental rules in an effort to reverse decades of environmental neglect.

The most important bill in this package was designed to restrict the use of fertilizer and to limit the nitrogen content in a bag of fertilizer. The increased amount of run-off containing fertilizer is causing the Barnegat Bay to undergo a process called eutrophication. Eutrophication results in the stimulation of algae growth and adversely changes the environment to the detriment of the clams, fish and other species and finally to the ultimate filling in of the bay. The Barnegat Bay is now classified as the second worst bay in America because of the extensive eutrophication occurring here. Signed into law on January 5, 2011, the legislation is an integral part to the rehabilitation of Barnegat Bay.

For the avid anglers, please remember that this is the first year New Jersey's Salt Water Fishing Registry is in effect to comply with national standards. The registry will allow fishermen and policy makers to work together to understand the impact of saltwater fishing on ocean ecosystems and coastal economies. The goal of the federal initiative, the Marine Recreational Information Program, is to provide the most accurate and up to date information to determine the health of fish stocks. This registry will assist in ensuring the long-term sustainability of recreational fishing. ### MOMENTS IN OUR HISTORY...

On March 1, 1932, 20-month old Charles Lindbergh Jr., was kidnapped from his crib at the home of his parents, famed aviator, Charles Lindbergh, and noted author, Anne Morrow Lindbergh, and two months later was found dead five miles from the Lindbergh home near Hopewell, NJ.

According to a newspaper report, two weeks after the kidnapping two men paid to rent a four-room tenant house located on River Road near what is now the Rutgers University Stadium entrance and Ivy Hall which is now a Middlesex County Museum. After paying the rent and returning the same day with a bed and mattress – the men left and never returned. The house the men rented is no longer there. Bruno Richard Hauptman was eventually arrested and executed in 1936 for the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby. It was Hauptman the driver of a Ford pick-up truck who paid to rent the house in Piscataway.

### CONGRATULATIONS! PISCATAWAY'S MUSEUM AWARDED \$150,000 GRANT

The Garden State Historic Trust Fund has awarded the Metlar-Bodine House Museum a \$150,000.00 grant, one of 29 capital improvements grants. The museum will use the proceeds to repair hearth beams in the oldest section of the historic site, circa 1728, and to build a new entrance and restrooms conforming to the American With Disabilities Act (ADA), making the site handicap accessible. The New Jersey Historic Trust will administer the grant.

In 2003, the Metlar-Bodine Museum, a National and State registered historic building, suffered a fire that severely damaged the structure, destroying over 30% of its collections of artifacts with local provenance. The site has received more than \$2.5 million in insurance, grants, private and corporate funding for its repair and restoration, and to

conserve artifacts.

The current \$150,000 grant is the fourth NJ Historic Trust Grant that Piscataway has won to restore the Township's Cultural and Historical Museum. Previous Trust grants include capital improvement grants of \$100,000 in 1993 for roof restoration, and \$150,000 for restoration of the porches, plus a \$50,000 management grant received in 2003.
