



## MAYOR'S MESSAGE

### *"State-of-the-Art Piscataway Senior Center Opens!"*

I am pleased to be able to let our residents know that the Piscataway Senior Citizen Center is now open! I know, full well, that our senior population was as eager as I and the council members were to get the Center up and running again.

The Senior Center has long had a variety of civic uses. It's the Township's official emergency site and the headquarters of the county Meals on Wheels program. In addition, it is host to a wide and diverse variety of programs and activities.

Even before the 2010 Census showed a 19 percent increase in the senior population, up from the 2000 Census, it was clear that an overhaul of the cramped building would be necessary.

We have added 3,500 square feet to the building making it now an 18,000 square foot building. It includes a computer lab, a home for our Office of Emergency Management supplies, classroom space, a large multi-purpose room, two new bathrooms, a pavilion and courtyard and an improved kitchen for the Meals on Wheels program. If you are a Cablevision customer, you will be able to bring your lap top and receive free Wi-Fi service. There are a total of 22 security cameras located both inside and outside of the Center which will provide security of the building itself as well as security to those people inside the Center.

The delay in reopening the Senior Center was due to a variety of construction issues but I'm certain once you stop into the Center I know you will realize that the wait was worth it. The new building will become an all-encompassing entity for the people in Piscataway – these additions and improvements should carry us for, at minimum, several decades.

There are a variety of Township activities and events coming up within the next few months and I invite our residents to consider participating in or attending some or all of these events. They are delineated elsewhere in this newsletter but I feel they deserve a second shout-out.

Residents are invited to join in a *Community-Wide Cleanup Litter Day* on Saturday, April 20th. The emphasis focuses

on waste reduction around the town which will help to beautify our Township. Groups, businesses, neighborhoods and individuals are encouraged to come out and join the fun. Your help will really make a difference. Piscataway's own museum, the *Metlar-Bodine House Museum*, will hold their 23rd annual major fund raising live auction on April 27th at the Radisson Hotel in Piscataway. The evening is always fast-paced and exciting and there is always an auction item that you just can't live without. Our *Street Fair*, run successfully every year for the last 21 years by the Public Relations Commission, is scheduled for May 11th. The Fair has something for people of all ages and is widely recognized in the area as the place to be on the second Saturday of May. For the first time, on June 1st and 2nd, Piscataway is participating in *RELAY FOR LIFE*, an event organized to raise funds for cancer. Since 1985, this world-wide event has raised over \$4 billion in the fight to eradicate cancer. Consider making this a part of your day in June. And I hope to see you all at our *Summer Concert Series*, sponsored by the Cultural Arts Commission, which will begin in July. All concerts are held on Thursdays and are a great way to relax and enjoy the melodic sounds of some wonderful entertainers.



 The Social Security Administration has expanded the services available with a *My Social Security* account, a personalized online account that people can use beginning in their working years and continuing throughout the time they receive Social Security benefits or for people who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI). ## DID YOU KNOW?

*The Maitland House*, located at 198 Lakeview Avenue, Piscataway, was the residence of Anna Lincoln Maitland, Abraham Lincoln’s half sister. President Lincoln’s father was Thomas Lincoln and Anna was a child of his second marriage. Lincoln’s mother, Nancy Hanks died in 1818, at the age of 35, and one year later his father married Elizabeth Johnston of Elizabeth, Kentucky. Anna’s son, Joseph, was 23 when President Lincoln was assassinated in April 1865 and he well remembered tales related by his mother of the childhood days of her famous half-brother. Joseph purchased the velocipede that is now part of the Metlar-Bodine House Museum, Piscataway’s own museum, located at 1241 River Road. Mr. Maitland served as Sexton of the First Baptist Church of New Market and was a Judge of Piscataway elections. His father was a descendant of Jefferson Davis, President of the Confederacy during the Civil War.



## Piscataway Police Officers receive awards for acts of bravery, life saving measures and contributions to the Police Department

\**Patrolman Todd Ritter* received the *Medal of Merit* for his action regarding a call that involved a barricaded subject and when the subject came out, firing at officers, Patrolman Ritter returned fire ending the threat and saving lives and serious injury to police and citizens alike. \**Sgt. Phil Zmuda* received the *Chief’s Award* for his work, including countless hours of his own time, on achieving a new state of the art Motorola Digital Radio System for the department. \**Patrolmen Renaldo Johnson, Ed White, Mike Trojanowski, Mike Medvecky, Rob Rose, Chris Raynor and Joseph Reilly* all received the *Defibrillator/CPR Award*. As a result of their expertise and quick action in separate instances, the residents who were found unresponsive, several with no pulse, are all alive today.

Piscataway native, *Officer Meredith Saultz*, has joined the Piscataway Police Department. Officer Saultz, a Rutgers University Criminal Justice graduate, was an officer for Rutgers Campus Police in Newark. In 2009, she graduated from the John H. Stamier Police Academy. She is a New Jersey firearms instructor, a member of the International Police Mountain Bike Association Training, New Jersey Women in Law Enforcement Training, and has a Black Belt in American Isshinryu Karate. We welcome Officer Saultz to our Township police force!

- Recycling/Trash Center Coupons and Recycling Center ID Passes have been mailed to every Township residential property owner. The Piscataway Township 2013 Recycling ID card **MUST BE PRESENTED AT THE GATE** along with Drivers License as Proof of Residency. The Rules and Hours of the Center were enclosed in the mailing.
- Coupons are required for bagged brush, lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other acceptable non-recyclable materials.
- Coupons are required for grass disposal and may be purchased in the Tax Office starting April 1, 2013 – 8:30 a.m. – 12:20 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. – 4:30 p.m. Cost per Coupon/ \$1.00, minimum purchase of two (2).

\*\*Coupons are not required for disposal of recyclable materials. This includes all recyclables picked up curbside, in addition to batteries, two (2) tires, motor oil, antifreeze and metal. **Brush may be brought no longer than 5 ft lengths or greater than 4 inches in diameter.** Residents are encouraged to recycle hazardous household material and paint at Middlesex County locations on the designated dates and times. **REMINDER TO RESIDENTS – WE DO NOT ACCEPT ANY HAZARDOUS WASTE OR TOXIC WASTE MATERIALS, CHEMICALS OR PAINTS AT THE DPW TRASH CENTER.**

\*\*All residents entering the Trash Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered in Piscataway. **REMINDER:** No trucks larger than half ton pickups are allowed and no trucks with sideboards will be allowed. Pickup trucks and full size vans are required to surrender two (2) coupons per visit.

\*\*ELECTRONIC WASTES are accepted at the Recycling Center. Residents still have the option of bringing them to SIMS – 401 Mill Street – Edison, NJ on the 1st Saturday of each month from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and on the 3rd Monday of each month from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m.

For a Bulk Trash/Brush curbside pick up, call 732-562-2390. Residents can schedule two (2) Bulk Trash pick ups and one (1) brush pick up available from January to mid-October. Branches must be bundled and tied. **NO BAGGED BRUSH ALLOWED.** During the summer months there could be a 6-8 week wait.

**NOTE:** Middlesex County Textile Recycling Bags are available in the Public Works Office.

## PROJECT MEDICAL CARD...

What is *PROJECT MEDICAL CARD*?

This is a pilot program launched in December 2012 for Middlesex County residents (age 60 and over or disabled), with a medical condition and access to a computer. *The PROJECT MEDICAL CARD* is the size of a credit card and holds a USB drive with a template for individuals to enter pertinent medical data. It plugs into a USB port on a computer and one’s medical history can be inputted, to assist one in relaying important medical information during an emergency situation. Participants, family members or medical personnel or anyone of your choosing may enter the data.

*PROJECT MEDICAL CARD* is a tool to track, and relay medical information as needed re your care. Data must be kept current and accurate. Updating medical information is the sole responsibility of the recipient of the card. This card is not intended to replace the need for further information and education on safe medication administration and consulting medical personnel with any concerns. This program is funded by the Governor’s Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse/Middlesex County Alliance Program. Current funding allows for a limited number of participants to receive this USB medical card free of charge. In order to register, interested individuals should call the Middlesex County Office of Aging and Disabled Services at 732-745-3295. Approved participants will receive the card and will be instructed on how to use it. Participants must ensure the care will be utilized.

## RELAY FOR LIFE OF PISCATAWAY – JUNE 1, 2013

*The journey to end cancer starts with a single step - CELEBRATE...REMEMBER...FIGHT BACK*

The American Cancer Society’s annual **RELAY FOR LIFE** event is one of hope and remembrance and, this year, will represent a century’s worth of work, dedication and support from thousands who attend and organize the gathering across the world.

**RELAY FOR LIFE** was established in 1985, has become a worldwide phenomenon, and has raised over \$4 billion to fight cancer.

On June 1-2, from 6:00 p.m. – 6:00 a.m. at the Piscataway High School Football Field, 100 Behmer Road, you are invited to join the global **RELAY FOR LIFE OF PISCATAWAY** movement. When you walk to end cancer at a **RELAY** event, it’s your opportunity to not only honor cancer survivors and remember lives lost, but also to aid awareness about what we can do to stay well from cancer and help to raise money to fuel the world’s largest walk to end cancer.

**SKIN CANCER:** - 200,000 cases expected to be diagnosed in the country in 2012.

**LUNG CANCER:** An estimated 160,340 deaths were expected to occur from lung cancer in 2012. Cigarette smoking is the most important risk factor for lung cancer. **BREAST**

**CANCER:** 226,870 new cases of invasive breast cancer were expected to occur during 2012. Breast cancer ranks second as a cause of cancer death in women (after lung cancer). **PROSTATE CANCER:** Approximately 241,740 new cases were diagnosed in 2012. **COLORECTAL**

**CANCER:** An estimated 103,170 new cases of colon and 40,290 cases of rectal cancer were expected to occur in 2012. **KIDNEY (renal)**

**CANCER:** 64,770 new cases of kidney (renal) cancer are estimated with 13,570 deaths from this disease in 2012. **BLADDER CANCER:**

An estimated 73,510 new cases were expected in 2012. **NON-HODGKINS LYMPHOMA (NHL):** It was estimated that 70,130 new cases of this type of cancer would be diagnosed in 2012. **THYROID CANCER:** Three out of four cases of thyroid cancer occur in women.

Surprisingly, it is the fastest-increasing cancer in both men and women. **ENDOMETRIAL CANCER:** The American Cancer Society

estimated 47,140 new cases of uterine corpus cancer.

**RELAY** teams’ camp out overnight and take turns walking or running around a track or path at a local high school, park, or fairground.

**RELAY** events are up to 24 hours in length and, because cancer never sleeps, each team is asked to have a least one participant on the track at all times.
