On behalf of the Township Council and myself I wish you and your families a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year. It seems a little redundant each year to note that the year goes by seemingly within the blink of an eye but that is exactly what it feels like. However, with each new year comes the promise of a new beginning and one that will be measurably better than the one we just left. Like the last many years, this year as well, we will continue to struggle with the economic realities we face on a daily basis in order to provide the best possible services to our residents at the lowest possible cost. There is little doubt that we are living in incredibly challenging times and that only makes us more resolute to find answers and stay focused on the issues confronting our residents and the community. I appreciate all the calls, letters and e-mails I received this past year and encourage you to continue this dialogue.

Piscataway turns 346 years old this year and will be celebrated at the annual Founders' Day program in February. If you are interested in knowing more

about our long history and how we have evolved through these many years I suggest that you check the library for an outstanding book by the late Dr. Walter C. Meuly, "History of Piscataway Township". The book covers the period: 1666-1976. This book is available for \$12 in the Township Clerk's office. Another book, mainly pictorial, "Images of America-Piscataway Township," by Randall Gabrielan may also be available in the library. It is also available for purchase in the Clerk's office for \$20. The pictures show sights and scenes in Piscataway never seen before this book. And how fortunate we are to have in our community our own cultural and history museum, The Metlar-Bodine House Museum located at 1281 River Road!. This is truly a community treasure and along with the many museum activities noted in each quarterly newsletter, a tour of the museum can be had by contacting the museum. The majority of the interesting artifacts on display in the museum were discovered right here in the Township, the rest in near by locations. If you haven't ever visited the museum, it's worth your time to check it out.

Piscataway has always been fortunate to have our citizenry volunteer for the benefit of the rest of us. The highly successful annual Street Fair, the monthly art exhibits in the Municipal Gallery, as well as many other programs and events are all organized and coordinated by volunteers - truly the backbone of our community. We remain ever grateful for the outstanding service rendered by the hundreds of professional volunteers of our six fire companies, Arbor, Holmes Marshall,

New Market, North Stelton, River Road and Possumtown, as well as the volunteers of the Arbor, River Road and North Stelton Rescue Squads. Thanks also to the members of the various Advisory Boards and Commissions who share their time and talent with all of us by serving on these boards. Since the Police Department initiated the Citizen Police Academy, these well-trained (CERT) graduates have proved extremely useful in a variety of ways. All of these folks are yours and my neighbors - their service is gratefully accepted and appreciated. We thank them one and all!

As I write this, Piscataway has not had a single snow flake - we can only hope that continues - but - if it does snow we ask residents to move their cars off the street and into the driveway in order to allow the snow plows to clear "curb to curb". And we ask you to please be patient - it's impossible to clean every street at the same time on the same day - we have 19 square miles to clear. Every area in the Township is assigned to specific equipment and personnel. Remember also, when shoveling your driveway, please throw the snow to the side of the driveway on your right hand side as you face out to the street. Should you have an emergency situation, please contact the Police Department where the appropriate emergency service will be coordinated with the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) and the Department of Public Works (DPW), and if needed, equipment will be diverted from their assigned work areas in order to accommodate the emergency.




- Recycling Center/Mini Dump 2012 Coupons & Recycling Center ID Pass Cards, mailed to all residential property owners by end of 2011 MUST be presented at the gate along with Driver’s License as proof of residency. Coupons are required for bagged brush, lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials. In addition to batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, leaves and metal, coupons are not required for disposal of recyclable materials, including recyclables picked up curbside. The largest vehicle allowed in the Recycling Center is a half-ton pickup truck. No trucks with build up sideboards are allowed. Pickup trucks must surrender two (2) coupons plus an additional coupon for a trailer no larger than 4x8 feet.
- NOT PERMITTED: HAZARDOUS OR TOXIC WASTES, CONSUMER ELECTRONICS, CHEMICALS OR PAINTS, CONTRACTOR DEBRIS, DIRT, CONCRETE OR OTHER ROCK TYPE DEBRIS. NOTE: Electronics can be brought to Sims, 401 Mill Road - Edison, NJ - 732-745-4170.
- Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pick ups and one (1) brush curbside pick up per household per calendar year. Call 732-562-2390 to schedule an appointment.
- REMINDER: Christmas trees will not be picked up - residents may bring them to their local firehouse during the month of January ONLY or they can be brought to the Recycling Center during winter hours. Trees must be devoid of all decorations - trees will be recycled.

METLAR/BODINE HOUSE MUSEUM (CIRCA 1728)

On March 24th, 2012, you’re sure to hear the BOOM as The Fellowship for Metlar House BLASTS OFF INTO THE 21ST CENTURY, when it hosts its 21st Dinner Auction to benefit Piscataway’s Historical & Cultural Museum. This annual event is one of the group’s major fund raising activities and will be held at The Radisson Hotel, 21 Kingsbridge Road, Piscataway. Tickets are \$80 per person and must be reserved by March 17th. Guests will be encouraged to dress in “space age” attire, adding to the evening’s atmosphere.

Doors open at 5 p.m. for an hour-long auction preview accompanied by complimentary wine and hors d’oeuvres. The fast-paced evening of fun begins at 6 p.m., and in addition to the live auction, includes a costume contest, silent auction, raffle and door prizes. Auctioneer Joe Bodnar will present more than 150 intriguing items going up for bid. They include meals at popular area restaurants, theater and movie tickets, antiques and collectibles, gift certificates from area merchants, vacation packages and much more. Since 1979 the Metlar-Bodine House has served as the Township’s Historical and Cultural Museum. A 2003 fire destroyed a portion of the museum and many irreplaceable objects with area provenance. The surviving structure and artifacts were severely damaged by smoke and water. Fundraisers, including the annual auction, have helped the museum in its recovery. \$2.5 million has restored the building, but additional funds must be raised to construct a handicap accessible entrance with restrooms: without these facilities, a state mandated permanent occupancy permit cannot be secured. In 2011, the Fellowship won a \$150,000 Garden State Cultural Trust grant, administered by the New Jersey Historic Trust to construct this new entrance. The Fellowship must raise \$150,000 to complete this important project and finally reopen the doors of this local treasure.

On the first Monday of each month residents have the opportunity to speak with the Mayor and his guests on Eye on Piscataway, the program hosted by Mayor Wahler. The November 2011 show featured Mack Harper, a VA medical administrative specialist who has helped to enroll over 25,000 veterans into the VA New Jersey Health Care System. He discussed who was eligible to enroll as there have been changes to the eligibility requirements over the last few years and he also discussed the US Senate approved measures to help unemployed former service members become employed. The Mayor's guests, from state, county and local officials and others offer a wide array of useful information. POLICE DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES 12-WEEK "CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY"

The Piscataway Police Department is once again offering Township residents an opportunity to become familiar with the day-to-day operations of their police department.

Piscataway Police will conduct a 12-week "Citizen Police Academy" Interactive program for residents beginning February 9, 2012. Participants from previous recruit classes have applauded the components of the curriculum. Resident, Benjamin Tang, a graduate of the 2008 class said, "Having the privilege of being a part of the Citizen Police Academy was not only an educational experience. It was a chance given to me by a group of professional law enforcement officers to allow me to become more aware of what our local Police Department is doing on a daily basis in securing and serving the community of Piscataway. I feel at ease knowing that we are in good hands."

Participants will gain a better understanding of the procedures, guidelines, responsibilities, demands of personnel and laws and policies that guide police decision making. Topics that will be covered will include but not limited to include: Overviews of the Department's organization and structure, recruitment, training, the roles and responsibilities of the various divisions and sections such as Patrol, Traffic, Investigations, Vice, Special Victims, Community Policing and the Emergency Services Unit. In addition, participants will be given an opportunity to experience a "ride along" with a police officer on patrol and experience firearms training.

The Citizen Police Academy is open to Piscataway Township residents who are over 21 years of age and who successfully complete a thorough background investigation. "Citizen Recruits" will meet one night a week on each Thursday for two (2) hours and one (1) selected Saturday. There is no cost to attend. Class size will be limited.
