



## MAYOR'S MESSAGE *"Much still remains to be done"*

It has been 50 years since Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., gave his famous "I Have a Dream" speech as a part of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. In 1963 over 250,000 thousand people came to our nation's capital to march for civil rights. People came from all parts of the country to march as a unified group. There were 10 speakers on the official program for the events at the Lincoln Memorial that day; Dr. King was the last speaker. Fifty years later the words that Dr. King spoke that day still resonate in 2013. He said, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal.

While much progress has been made through these 50 years in addressing past grievances and in assuring the civil and human rights of all Americans, much still remains to be done. As a member of the non-partisan U. S. Conference of Mayors

I am pleased that we are now working with UNESCO and the U.S. Department of State to establish the U.S. Coalition of Cities Against Racism and Discrimination. A 10-Point Plan of Action was drafted by a group of Conference of Mayors leaders at a leadership meeting and has been sent to other mayors so that they can sign onto this plan, thereby committing to carry out the action steps it calls for. The plan includes the following:

1. Continue collective efforts to speak out against racism and other forms of discrimination and propose solutions, and join with national civil rights organizations in this effort;
2. Advocate for inclusion and non-discrimination in all federal laws, policies, and programs;
3. Work toward sentencing and prison reform to reduce disparities between blacks and Hispanics and whites in sentences and incarceration rates;
4. Improve the ability of people released from prison, who are disproportionately black and Hispanic, to reenter their communities through increased federal support for Second Chance programs and changes in policies and procedures which make it difficult, if not impossible, to become productive members of society;
5. Continue calling for an expanded national effort to reduce poverty, which disproportionately affects minority communities, and create employment opportunities by increasing job creation, job training, child care availability, transportation availability, affordable

- housing, and other needed assistance;
6. Ensure that city policies and procedures promote inclusion and do not discriminate and that employees are provided the training needed to implement them;
7. Use the bully pulpit to provide leadership on issues of concern, engage in the difficult conversations that may be needed, speak out against hate crimes and all discriminatory acts whenever they occur, and provide comfort and assistance to victims of discrimination;
8. Work with the school system to promote education about differences, the importance of tolerance, and behavior that respects differences among people;
9. Facilitate the integration of immigrants and other new residents into the community;
10. Encourage community activities which celebrate diversity and educate city residents about the different cultures that compose a city's population.

An interesting aside regarding Dr. King's 1963 speech and what happened to it when the speech was over. We have recently learned that retired University of Iowa basketball coach, George Raveling, is in possession of Dr. King's original typewritten speech. Raveling, standing very near Dr. King when the speech ended asked him for the copy and Dr. King handed it to him. Raveling has been offered \$3 million for the document and recently said, "It would be sacrilegious of me to try to sell it or to profit from it. Everything in life you can't equate in money."

***REMINDER: Please be considerate of your neighbors and pick up after your animals. - Recycling/Trash Center Coupons and Recycling Center 2013 Trash Coupons MUST be presented at the Gate, along with Driver’s License as Proof of Residency. Rules & Regulations were mailed with Coupons.
- Residents entering the Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed in the Center is a half-ton pickup. Pickup trucks must surrender two (2) coupons. NO COMMERCIAL TRUCKS OR TRUCKS WITH SIDEBOARDS ARE PERMITTED.
- Coupons ARE required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other acceptable non-recyclable materials. Coupons are NOT required for disposal of recyclable materials. This includes all recyclables picked up curbside, in addition to batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, and metal.
- PLEASE NOTE: Residents must obtain Coupons in the Tax Office in the Municipal Building to obtain leaf bags. (Tax Office hours: Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Residents will be given two (2) free Coupons. Each Coupon is for one (1) bundle of twenty (20) bags. Additional Coupons may be purchased for \$6.00 per bundle. LEAF BAGS WILL NOT BE ISSUED WITHOUT COUPONS.
- LEAF BAGS: Biodegradable leaf bags will be available on or about September 30, 2013 at the DPW garage – Monday-Friday – 7 a.m. – 6 p.m. PROOF OF RESIDENCY IS REQUIRED. These bags are to be used for LEAVES ONLY. Leaf pick up will begin the week of October 15, 2013 and will continue to December 31, 2013.
- Curbside pick up and disposal of leaf bags at the Recycling Center is free between October 1, 2013 and December 31, 2013.
- Christmas trees will not be picked up curbside. During the month of January only, you may bring them to your nearest firehouse anytime of the day. Trees, devoid of all decorations, may be brought to the Recycling Center during regular hours.
