Extra charges include an air-conditioning surcharge, cable television and telephone.

The Community Room is utilized for many different functions, such as Bingo, Movie Night, Game Night, Exercise Classes, Monthly Luncheons, Holiday Parties, and each weekday morning, there is plenty of coffee, tea and conversation!

Owned by Piscataway Township, **Sterling Village** was built in the early 90's as safe, fun apartment living for seniors, 62 years of age and older, to age in place with their friends and neighbors. Sterling Village is independent living, close to friends and family and adjacent to the Piscataway Senior Center and J.F. Kennedy Library. You do not need to be a Piscataway resident to apply. **\*Residents will receive Recycling Center/Mini Dump 2017 Coupons & Recycling Center ID Pass Cards** in the mail in the next few months. These coupons and pass cards **MUST** be presented at the gate along with Driver's License as proof of residency. Coupons are required for bagged brush, lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials, in addition to batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, leaves and metal. Coupons are not required for disposal of recyclable materials, including recyclables picked up curbside. Included in the package will be two (2) coupons for two (2) bundles of 20 leaf bags per bundle. The largest vehicle allowed in the Recycling Center is a half-ton pickup truck. No trucks with build up sideboards are allowed. Pickup trucks must surrender two (2) coupons plus an additional coupon for a trailer no larger than 4x8 feet.

**\*NOT PERMITTED, HAZARDOUS OR TOXIC WASTE, CHEMICALS OR PAINTS, CONTRACTOR DEBRIS, DIRT, CONCRETE OR OTHER ROCK TYPE DEBRIS.** NOTE: Electronics can be brought to the mini-dump during mini-dump hours. No electronics will be picked up curbside.

\*Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pick ups and one (1) brush curbside pick up per household per calendar year. Call 732-562-2390 to schedule an appointment. The curbside/bulk pick up resumes on Tuesday, January 10, 2017.

**CHRISTMAS TREES** will not be picked up – residents may bring them to your local firehouse only during the month of January or they can be brought to the Recycling Center during winter hours. Trees must be devoid of all decorations – trees will be recycled.

## PISCATAWAY 2018 REASSESSMENT INFORMATION

Piscataway Township is conducting a reassessment of all real estate in the Township. The Township last revalued properties in 2014. Realty Appraisal Company ([www.realtyappraisal.net](http://www.realtyappraisal.net)) has been hired to assist in the reassessment process. The purpose of the reassessment is to value all property at its current market value. In order to conduct a reassessment the State of New Jersey requires properties be inspected within four (4) years of the effective date of the reassessment. Township properties were last inspected in 2012 and 2013 which is why inspections are being conducted now.

Data Collectors from Realty Appraisal will go to every taxable property within the Township to inspect the interior and verify exterior measurements gathering information on the number of rooms, number of bathrooms and plumbing fixtures, type of heating and cooling systems, basement & attic finish, decks, patios, in-ground pools and physical condition of interior and exterior.

Personal items such as furniture do not influence the value of property.

Data Collectors carry picture identification cards and a letter of introduction from the Tax Assessor, Ms. Lisa Stephens.

**DO NOT LET ANYONE INTO YOUR HOME/BUILDING WITHOUT THE IDENTIFICATION DESCRIBED ABOVE.**

If you have any doubts contact the Tax Assessor's Office (732-562-2328) or Piscataway Police Department (732-562-1100).

If you are not home the Collector will complete an exterior inspection, estimate interior data and leave their card and phone number and instructions on how the owner can make an appointment. Data Collectors are not appraisers and will not be able to answer questions regarding property values or taxes. Notification of new values will be mailed to all property owners in the fall of 2017. If a property owner is not satisfied with the results of the reassessment or information review of their property, a formal appeal may be filed with Middlesex County Board of Taxation on or before May 1, 2018.

 **With cold weather here** to stay for a while PSE&G reminds customers that, if eligible, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance program (LIHEAP) is accepting applications for the 2016-2017 heating season. LIHEAP is a program run by the State of NJ, Dept., of Community Affairs. To be eligible for LIHEAP benefits, the applicant's household gross income must meet monthly income guidelines. For example, a family of four with a monthly income of \$4,050 or less per month may be eligible and should apply. 

# SENATOR BOB SMITH BATTLES TO PRESERVE OPEN SPACE IN NEW JERSEY

As Chairman of the Senate Environment and Energy Committee, State Senator Bob Smith never backs down when the health of our state and its residents are on the line. A former professor of environmental science with advanced degrees in chemistry, environmental science, and law, Smith has long been considered the foremost steward of our environment here in New Jersey and is the author of some of the toughest environmental laws in the nation. Like most residents of the Garden State, Senator Smith understands that our open space resources, including farmland preservation and historic preservation, are at a premium and he has been fighting for a stable source of this funding for years with strong bipartisan support within the legislature. Yet, Governor Christie positioned himself as an obstacle to open space programs exhausting all of these funds during the first year of his administration.

Historically, New Jersey has set the national standard for open space preservation, and since 1961, residents have overwhelmingly voted to dedicate funding towards protecting our open space. With this funding exhausted, Smith knew it was important to develop a stable source of funding. This is why he wrote legislation to dedicate a portion of the Corporate Business Tax to forever fund preservation of open space, farmland and historic assets in the Garden State. On Election Day in November of 2014, voters, by a great margin, passed the ballot initiative to amend New Jersey's Constitution to dedicate these funds. The constitutional amendment required enabling legislation, to implement the will of the voters. Despite the overwhelming passage of the 2014 voter-approved constitutional amendment, the Governor conditionally vetoed Smith's enabling legislation (S-969). Smith immediately went on the offense, "Not only has the governor failed our state and our environment for the past two years, leaving open space with inadequate funding, but he has failed in his duty to uphold the constitution. Instead, he is destroying the Garden State's most valuable natural resources by refusing a well-thought and researched bill that received bipartisan support. Unfortunately, it is our children and their children who will pay the high price of his inaction. Shame on him. I will continue to fight to preserve the integrity of our state's environment, and the wishes of the voters of New Jersey." With the Governor facing an override of his conditional veto on June 27, 2016, the legislature and the Governor reached an 11<sup>th</sup> hour agreement.

As the most densely populated state in the country, open space, farmland and historic preservation cannot be jeopardized. Protected parcels of land for the enjoyment and health of our children and grandchildren and future generations is now a reality. Smith's idea of dedicating the Corporate Business Tax monies will ensure that we do not run out of money again while not hurting our pocketbooks or increasing state debt is a winner for taxpayers. The Green Acres program, in existence for over a half century, has protected over 650,000 acres of land throughout the state. Long term funding of this program has become even more essential as climate change is causing "100 year storms" to occur at more regular intervals. Open space funding can also be used for Blue Acres Projects-a willing seller program that buys flood-prone land and land that buffers or protects other lands from storm damage.

This past fall at a State House press conference with the Keep It Green Coalition, Senator Smith said, "This stable source of funding for open space has been the Holy Grail of the environmental movement in New Jersey for 50 years. It's a major, major change in how we do preservation in New Jersey." Senator President Steve Sweeney, in attendance, praised Smith indicating this is legacy legislation for Smith saying, "Bob Smith has done a phenomenal job with this and when I say legacy I don't use it lightly. It's real."
