Mayor's Message

Brian C. Wahler, Mayor

Tax rates throughout Piscataway have gone down because of one big reason: The Township Council and I make a priority of bringing new businesses into Piscataway that add to our tax base. Each governing body in Piscataway that sets its own tax rate and budget – the Township, Middlesex County, School Board, etc. – has been able to take advantage of this new economic activity.

How does this affect your property tax bill? The amount you pay is determined by the value of your home multiplied by each of the tax rates. Throughout Piscataway, property values have recently risen, especially in the Arbor area. That is why lowering tax rates is so important because it can offset some of the impact of an increase to the value of your home.

For new businesses in the Township, more than offering jobs for our residents, they also contribute new, notable sums that help pay for needed services. Piscataway has always been a great place to live and work, but for many years, commercial properties throughout the Township have been home to

vacant office buildings and empty industrial sites. But now, the changing national marketplace with so many people purchasing goods online comes with a need for more clean warehousing. With the economic lifeline of I-287, Piscataway is now home to more state-of-the-art distribution centers.

Our expanding local economy is enabling us to build our Piscataway Community Center. We already have an architect and construction management team in place and

a general contractor is expected to soon be hired. Everything is on track to enjoy the completed Community Center in the Summer of 2020.

In the meantime, the Township Council and I continue to make more progress that improves our quality of life. A robust Township-led roadwork program is refurbishing many of our streets, in several cases a full reconstruction with curbs, sidewalk and resurfacing and many more with new pavement. This work is complemented by additional road improvements by Middlesex County and PSE&G.

The Township also installed new playgrounds at Perrine, Red Bud, Sturbridge, Tara and Yorktowne parks, in some cases with new park shelters and all with new landscaping. Perrine Park is also getting a new, outdoor adult fitness area.

Our libraries and Senior Center continue to provide a wonderful assortment of programs and our Recreation Department has great activities for all ages, especially our youth programs which are all free.



Do you know where your local taxes go? Compared to last year, it's largely unchanged. As shown in the new pie chart, you can see how in 2018 after being collected by the Township, nearly three-quarters of the funds will be sent to the county, four fire districts (each with their own tax rate), library system and school board. It's important to know that the Township Council takes some of its revenue and provides additional funding to the library system for its programming and personnel on top of what is automatically dedicated to its needs.



Certificate of Continued Occupancy (CCO)

To help ensure the health, safety and general welfare of the residents, effective January 1, 2019, a Certificate of Continued Occupancy (CCO) will be required when selling a home in Piscataway. The property will be inspected for basic safety requirements such as working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors as well as a fire extinguisher. Inspectors will also make sure that proper construction permits were filed for any improvements made to the home and that all permits issued have been closed.

Protection of Public's Right to Beach Access Advances

As Chairman of the Senate Environment and Energy Committee, protecting the public's rights to access Garden State waterfronts and beaches remains an environmental priority for me. New Jersey's shores and riverfronts have sustained millions of people each year for generations. Individual memories and experiences made can never be fabricated, nor can they be lost. It is undoubtedly crucial that public access to these communities improve and remain part of the people's land.

My love for the Jersey shore extends beyond personal enjoyment and into a devout eagerness for it to be utilized to the advantage of as many families and residents as possible. Clear passageways onto a beach or waterfront opens myriad options to those curious in exploring open waters or a new relaxation spot. Tourism, a great

factor that ensures the quality of life in New Jersey, is highly influenced by the adequacy and access of shorelines in particular. Economically, the tourism industry generates an annual \$36 billion per year to fund the state and its seaside communities. With these factors in mind, I am continuing the crusade for legislation, S-1074, which once enacted into state law will preserve the public's rights to access New Jersey's beloved waters.

Residents have the absolute right to enjoy the multitudes of waterways that make the Garden State one of the most beautiful and unique places of its kind. Not only is New Jersey bordered by the Atlantic Ocean but also by major bodies of water such as the Delaware and Hudson rivers.

Public access to these natural resources is protected under the Public Trust Doctrine. The bill, S-1074, states, "The public has longstanding and inviolable rights under the Public Trust Doctrine to use and enjoy the State's tidal waters and adjacent shorelines for recreational uses, including, but not limited to, bathing, swimming, fishing, and other shore-related activities."

Last session, the beach access legislation was stalled in the Budget and Appropriations Committee. This session, the bill was amended in the Budget and Appropriations Committee and passed the Senate by a vote of 36-4 on June 21, 2018. Dedicated measures by the Senate to ensure public access to waterfronts and beaches are in steady advancement and are now moving through the General Assembly. In the near future, and for the betterment of New Jersey's communities, public access will hopefully be enacted and reclaimed as the people's right. With the passage of this legislation, the Garden State and its shores will remain host to New Jersey citizens enjoying this great resource and providing billions in tourism revenue.

Recycling Center coupons: Coupons are mailed on a yearly basis to residents along with the required rules and regulations. Duplicate coupons may be obtained at the Public Works office. Coupons must first be presented at the gate as well as a driver's license and proof of residency. Residents entering the Recycling Center must have their vehicle properly insured, inspected and registered.

Grass coupons: September 29, 2018 is the final day that residents will be required to present coupons at the Recycling Center.

Curbside/bulk pick-up: October 12, 2018 is the final day for scheduled curbside/bulk pick up for appointments made by September 14, 2018. This program will resume on January 8, 2019.

Leaf bags: Biodegradable leaf bags will be available October 1 through December 14, 2018 at the DPW yard door #11, Mondays through Fridays from 7 a.m.-6 p.m. Since two free leaf bag coupons were not included in the 2018 Recycling Usage Package mailed to residents in January 2018, two free bundles of leaf bags may be picked up with proof of residency. Additional leaf bags may be purchased for \$6 per bundle at the Tax Collector's office. Additional leaf bags will not be issued without proof of purchase. The purchase of additional leaf bags will also be available on Saturday, November 3, 2018 from 8:30 a.m.-4:15 p.m. in the Tax Collector's office. Leaf bag curbside pick-up will commence on October 15, 2018 and will continue until December 28, 2018. Leaf bags are for leaves only.

Christmas trees: Christmas trees will not be picked up curbside. You may bring them devoid of decorations to your nearest firehouse or to the Recycling Center during regular hours until January 31, 2019.

Flu shot clinic – Monday, October 1st, 9 a.m.-Noon by the Middlesex County Office of Health Services. Reservations may be made starting on September 1st by calling the Senior Center at (732) 562-1133.

Medicare covers the cost of both the influenza and pneumonia vaccines. For Medicare eligible residents, please bring your new or old Medicare card which you are required to show the registrar whom will document its number on the consent form. Senior Center staff will take care of billing Medicare.

For those residents whom are not Medicare eligible, the cost is \$15 in cash for the influenza vaccine (available to all ages) and \$65 in cash for the pneumonia vaccine (only offered to residents ages 65 and over).

Two different types of pneumonia shots will be offered: Prevnar 13 (new vaccine) and Pneumovax 23 (original vaccine). However, we will need a note from the resident's physician stating which one is needed or which one was already taken. Those residents who got their pneumonia vaccine through our annual county "flu clinics" were given Pneumovax 23. (We might even have a record of it.) There must be a 12 month-interval between vaccines. If a resident has never had a pneumonia vaccine, Prevnar 13 will be administered.
