Mayor's Message

Brian C. Wahler, Mayor

Whether it is building the Piscataway Community Center, refurbishing parks or resurfacing roads, our community continues to move forward. Moreover, new companies continue to move into the Township to provide good paying jobs for hard working residents.

While the Township Council and I continue to steer carefully our municipal finances, one issue before us is better put to your judgment.

In New Jersey, Piscataway is one of many municipalities that function under the Faulkner Act through which residents may amend the municipal code through an initiative petition process.

Earlier this year, the New Brunswick-based offices of Food & Water Watch, an international progressive organization headquartered in Washington, DC, helped a group of Piscataway residents circulate such a petition in our Township to create the

“Piscataway Community Energy Aggregation” (PCEA) program. Under their proposed program, the Township would be required to make 100 percent renewable energy available to residents by 2035 preceded by increased benchmarks in the interim years such as 50 percent by 2024.

It is laudable to move away from fossil fuel use. For example, currently, 25 percent of the electricity purchased by the Township for government use comes from renewable sources – and this does not include our use of solar panels. However, this measure would oblige the Township to enter into contracts with private power providers. As you know, homeowners have their own relationship with PSE&G. This measure would add the Township government into these affairs.

The petition does call for non-residential consumers to be able to opt into the program and residential customers to opt out. However, the compulsory bulk purchasing of energy by the Township has the potential to alter market forces. Electricity bills could decrease or increase. Such a contract between the municipal government and a private power provider could also influence the

Township budget and that could affect property taxes.

With enough registered voters having signed the initiative petition, under state law our Township Council only has two choices: 1) enact into the municipal code the language used in the petition exactly or substantively, or 2) put the petition language on the ballot. Because this measure may create a substantial financial impact to residents, the Township Council and I think it best to let you the voters decide. As such, this measure will be on the November 5th general election ballot.

Meanwhile, the Township will maintain our own strong efforts in going greener that also include electric vehicle charging stations at the Community Center as well as new commercial facilities. We will also continue being pragmatic with our budget.

Having now two years of a lower Township tax rate while building a \$32 million Community Center with no residents' tax monies and maintaining an “AA+ stable” bond rating with Standard & Poor's is a remarkable achievement. By properly handling our finances, the Township Council and I have been able to maintain last year's 12.8 percent drop of the municipal tax rate with a new budget that has no new taxes.

Some residents may have experienced a higher property tax bill possibly from other governing authorities having new tax rates and/or the value of their home increasing. Nevertheless, the Township budget – which only receives just over a quarter of your property tax bill – remains sound and sensible.

A Legacy of Open Space

Our state is the most densely populated in the nation which makes us unique. We treasure the areas that give our communities character and give us outdoor places to walk and enjoy. We love our Jersey Fresh vegetables and work to preserve our farmland. We take great pride in our beautiful state with its natural diversity of mountains, farms, beaches, forests and historic sites.

As Chair of the Senate Environment and Energy Committee, I am honored to report that after decades we have achieved the “holy grail” of environmental conservation by creating a stable source of funding for these areas we all hold precious.

Historically, tremendous support has been shown for the bond funding needed to preserve open space, farmland and historic areas. Every time there was a ballot initiative on this topic, New Jersey voters have showed overwhelming bipartisan support. Since 1961, there have been 13 ballot measures and all 13 have passed. The problem, of course, was that this funding was done by adding new debt. We needed a stable source of funding without incurring new debt. In 2014, the ballot measure, which called for a Constitutional amendment to dedicate state funds for open space preservation, won by a margin of about 2:1. On June 26th, the long-awaited open space legislation was signed into law (P.L.2019, c.136). This legislation allocates funding from constitutionally dedicated corporate business tax (CBT) revenues for the State’s open space, farmland and historic preservation programs for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 and beyond.



New Jersey now has a stable source of funds to preserve our open spaces without incurring any new debt for our taxpayers

This stable source of funds allows our State’s open space to be preserved and protected while keeping our taxpayers out of any new debt. Dedicating CBT monies for preservation provides a stable source of funding which can sustain our land, farmland and historic site preservations for future generations. The passing of this legislation is monumental for New Jersey’s environment, ensuring that we will continue to be the great Garden State!

The Piscataway Service Card – Streamlining public works for you!

Tired of rummaging for leaf bag coupons? Want to cut down on the postal mail you get?

The Township is excited to bring you the new Piscataway Service Card. Whether it is recycling e-waste or disposing of bulk trash, brush from your yard or leaves, this new card will make your trip to the Public Works yard easier and faster.

The ID packet includes a wallet size card and two key chain-size cards so your entire household can take advantage of this new program.

The card packet itself is free. Instead of going to the Tax Collector's office to purchase additional leaf bag bundles you will be able to pay for and collect the additional bags right at the Public Works facility. Additional bundles can also be purchased in the Public Works office.


Public Works office staff will accept credit cards, debit cards and checks to put coupon credits on your card. However, no cash is accepted.

Using the card begins in January. However, you can pick up your card at the Public Works office starting in October – and we encourage you to do so sooner rather than later.

No longer will you need coupons when you come to the Public Works yard to dispose of items or recycle. The Piscataway Service Card features a bar code directly linked to your postal address and tax record. Township staff will use hand-held scanners to verify your card for your needs:

- Recycling – If you have computers, TVs or even just household paper and plastic, whatever we normally accept for recycling, just show your card. You can also still put your household recycling at your curb for pick-up.
- Bulk trash drop-offs – Instead of presenting a driver's license or utility bill for proof of residency, just have your card scanned. You get four drop-offs per year, and that is in addition to two bulk trash pick-ups per year.
- Grass & small yard waste – A \$1 credit permits you to dump a 35-gallon container of grass clippings. Just put whatever dollar amount you need on your card and bring in your yard debris for disposal. You still get one free curbside brush pick-up each year.
- Leaves – Rather than get two free leaf bag coupons in the mail, credit for two bundles of twenty leaf bags will be on your card. Additional bundles of twenty bags are \$8 each. You can put money on your card at the Public Works office and pick up your bags there too.

Are you a renter? Your landlord will need to obtain an ID packet and give it to you. Should you move, give the packet back to your landlord for the new tenants.



Can you give your card to a contractor to dispose of items for you? Unfortunately, no. In order to prevent abuse of the system, the cardholder must be present for the card to be used. In addition, neither commercial vehicles nor construction debris are accepted into the Public Works yard. This includes residents performing their own construction work; we cannot accept this type of debris.

Remember, the card packet is free. If you lose your cards, there is a \$5 replacement fee.

The cards will not be mailed so please come to the Public Works office at 505 Sidney Road starting on Tuesday, October 1st and pick up your Piscataway Service Card packet. The Public Works office is open Mondays-Fridays from 8:30 a.m.-12:20 p.m. and 1:30-4:30 p.m.

The Piscataway Township Police Department is proud to announce its new citizen police academy for seniors to learn about law enforcement and be better empowered to help the community.



Do you know where your local taxes go? Compared to 2017 and 2018, it's largely unchanged.

As shown in this pie chart, you can see how in 2019 after being collected by the Township, nearly three-quarters of the funds are then sent to the county, four fire districts (each with their own tax rate), library system and school board.

It's important to know that the Township Council takes some of its revenue and provides additional funding to the library system for its programming and personnel on top of what is automatically dedicated to its needs.
