## Mayor's Message

**Brian C. Wahler, Mayor**

**W**e are building our Community Center. Our anticipation is now a reality. We have generated an economic boom of new companies in Piscataway that are producing needed revenue. We have completed almost all of the planning. As a result, the Township Council and I are thrilled to move forward with what will certainly be the crown jewel of our community.

Piscataway prides itself on having a wide array of recreation opportunities. With our Community Center, we can expect even so much more: an aquatic center with three pools, a full-size basketball court with an overhead running track, a fitness center with modern exercise machines, dance and art studios, a youth activity room, a community room, men's, women's and family locker rooms, a café and a large space for group meetings.

This is a large and worthwhile investment for all of Piscataway's families. It will be

located on Hoes Lane just south of the Kennedy Library branch.

The preconstruction phase will soon be completed, the building plans are before us and key professionals are in place.

A construction management firm, Cumming Corporation, and Netta Architects have both been brought aboard and are moving this priority project through what is known as the bid phase. Our professional team will develop a construction schedule, make sure the building plans are in order and get us prepared to bid for construction work this September. We expect to hire a general

contractor by November. Then moving ahead with construction, the Community Center is expected to be fully built and open to the public by Summer 2020.

Constructing the Community Center has been a long time in coming. The national economic downturn delayed us from building it without significantly impacting taxpayers. In addition, we needed the State to finish its Route 18 project which significantly impacted the site's area, not just in the roadway system but in fiber optics and other underground infrastructure. Now that economic development has been flourishing in Piscataway and Route 18 is finished, we can move forward.

The final cost amount will be known later this summer when the architects and engineers put together the bid specifications for the actual construction work. However, what it will cost to build and what it will cost the Township are actually two different questions.

It is important to know that much of the funding for the construction will be coming from impact fee agreements established with new companies moving into Piscataway. In fact, this same economic development has enabled the Township to lower its tax rate this year by 12 percent. With this revenue, county cultural

Make sure that only a qualified contractor is working on your home! The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) recently relaxed rules regarding construction permits for certain work on homes. That is why it is even more important that if you hire a contractor that you ask these two questions:


- What is your DCA Home Improvement Contractor License number?
- What is your insurance coverage?

The new state rules are meant to relieve contractors of getting a state construction permit to do "ordinary maintenance." However, the list is far from ordinary. Permits are no longer required for roofs, siding, direct replacement of plumbing fixtures and alarm systems in single family homes.

The Township Council's success in boosting economic development is good news both to Piscataway's homeowners and all of its hard-working residents. The Township's tax rate is being lowered this year by twelve percent. How often do you hear that in New Jersey?

Do you know where your local taxes go? As shown in the pie chart, you can see how in 2017, after being collected by the Township, nearly three-quarters of the funds are then sent to the county, four fire districts (each with their own tax rate), library system and school board. Please understand though that other governing authorities such as Middlesex County and the school board determine their own tax rates and budgets. It's also important to know that the Township Council takes some of its revenue and provides additional funding to the library system for its programming and personnel on top of what is automatically dedicated to its needs.

## Palimpsest: The Cultural Landscape of Camp Kilmer on Livingston Campus

Situated on a quiet corner of Livingston Campus in Piscataway, a wide chevron of non-descript buildings serve as the hub for the Rutgers University-New Brunswick operations and maintenance facilities. But these structures belie a secret: they mark the original depot for Camp Kilmer, a vast military facility and gateway through which 3 million troops, prisoners of war and Hungarian refugees passed through during WWII and the Korean conflict from June 1941 through July 1953.

Inspired by the concept of “palimpsest” – the physical evidence of historic reuse - RU graduate Kimberly Tryba has chronicled the site’s hidden history and transition by following the historical development of its natural and cultural landscape from colonial agrarian community to military encampment and, finally, its current and future use by Rutgers.



# Operation Chill

This summer, local law enforcement officers will be dispensing well-deserved Slurpee justice to good kids in Piscataway Township. For the 23rd year, 7-Eleven is working with local police and sheriff's departments to distribute free Slurpee drink coupons to children and youth through its popular Operation Chill community-service program.

During 2018, 7-Eleven will issue up to 1.4 million Slurpee coupons to almost 1,100 law enforcement agencies; 550 of those will be distributed in Piscataway Township, most during the summer months and back-to-school season.

"We are always looking for ways to help our officers build strong relationships in the community," Police Chief Scott L. Cartmell said. "Operation Chill makes it easy to interact with kids in a positive way. This is a great short- and long-term investment for 7-Eleven and for us."

Big-city departments and small-town forces alike use the Slurpee coupons to enhance relationships with the young people of their cities by rewarding them for good deeds, constructive activities and acts of kindness. Appropriate "offenses" might include helping another person, deterring crime or participating in a community- or police-sponsored event. Although the reasons for being "ticketed" are varied, the end result is the same for every youngster: a free Slurpee drink and a smile for being a good kid. Each coupon can be redeemed for a small Slurpee drink at participating 7-Eleven stores.

The Center is closed on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays as well as certain holidays.

Need to dispose of leaves? Grass? Please make sure to get your "grass disposal coupons" at one coupon per bag. With a minimum purchase of two coupons, they are \$1 each. Checks should be made out to "Township of Piscataway." Grass disposal coupons may be bought at the Tax Collector's office at Town Hall, 455 Hoes Lane, Piscataway, NJ 08854 in person on Mondays through Fridays from 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m.-4:30 p.m. or through the mail by writing to the Tax Collector's office.

Public Works will not pick up leaf bags until the Fall, and residents who leave leaf bags on the curb after receiving a notice to abate may be subject to a fine. However, residents may bring them to the Mini-Dump Center during its regular hours. Only 2018 coupons may be used in this calendar year. Unbagged vegetation such as branches brought to the Center do not need a grass disposal coupon.

Need to get rid of lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture or other such non-recyclable materials? This is when to use one or more of the four Recycling/Mini-Dump Center coupons you were sent in January in a packet that came with a Recycling Center ID and rules & regulations. When you bring any of these materials to the Center at 505 Sidney Road, you must have at the gate a 2018 coupon and proof of residency, either a driver's license or a Recycling Center ID. A car-load of these materials needs one coupon; a pick-up truck needs two coupons.

Residents entering the Center must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick-up truck. No commercial vehicles, trucks with side boards, boxed U-Hauls or moving trucks are permitted.

What to do with materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, certain metal items (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners), certain electronics (televisions, desktop or personal computers, computer monitors, portable computers, desktop printers, desktop fax machines) as well as any recyclables usually picked up curbside? You can bring these to the Center and do not need a coupon.

Some items may not be brought to the Center. No paint, hazardous waste, kitchen garbage, contractor debris, dirt, rocks or concrete are handled by the Township. The Center will also not accept other electronics such as cell phones, copiers, digital cameras, DVD players, e-book readers, keyboards, MP3 players, modems, mice, personal digital assistants (PDAs), scanners, stereo and radio equipment, telephones, VCRs or any products that contain rechargeable batteries not included in this list. Please contact the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management at (732) 745-4170 for information on how to dispose of such items.

Need a special curbside pick up? Until mid-October, residents may schedule two curbside trash pick ups and one curbside branch pick up. To schedule, please call the Public Works Department at (732) 562-2390 no later than September 14<sup>th</sup>.

Please keep in mind that for branches picked up curbside, the bundles must be tied with string and be no wider than one foot in diameter. Crews will not take any branches longer than five feet in length and no wider than four inches in diameter. Any bundles containing construction type wood, metal or other foreign objects will not be taken. Please stack the bundles neatly at the curb, making the pile no longer than ten feet in length, five feet deep and four feet high.
