## Mayor's Message

**a**lmost every day you can see progress with the Piscataway Community Center through the live streaming video accessed on the Township website showing crews hard at work.

A lot of diligent planning and perseverance in overcoming obstacles got us to the point where we could start construction this past winter. Strong efforts began several years ago to convince state transportation officials to invest in needed road and underground infrastructure upgrades. Finishing Route 18, improving Stockton Street and building overhead walkways for better neighborhood access were all critical steps that had to take place. Building the Community Center would have been much more expensive to the Township if these improvements by the state were not first made.

Another hurdle was financing which the great recession in 2008 then made impossible. Nevertheless, Township officials continued with its plans to have everything ready when the economy would make a turn for the better. During this time, the Community Center's design would go through a number of changes to reflect new and growing needs. What originally began as just replacing the old municipal pool has now become a three-pool, indoor aquatic center, full-size basketball court with overhead running track, gym, and rooms for dancing, art and youth activities.

The last big obstacle was Hurricane Sandy. Necessary utility work to benefit the Community Center was put on hold for over 18 months as all of the available contractors went to the Jersey Shore to make needed repairs in towns devastated by the storm.

However, seeing the needs of local families who had to sleep and shower at Piscataway High School right after Hurricane Sandy

until power was restored locally made it apparent to all that we needed our Community Center to also function as an evacuation site. Working with state emergency officials, we made several design improvements such as having large-scale generators so, if ever needed, our families can stay safe on a 24/7 basis during a crisis situation.

Fortunately, the Community Center is being built without affecting the tax dollars of our hard-working residents. Funding for the \$32 million facility is coming from the economic boost of state-of-the-art warehousing and other new companies that the Township Council and I attracted to Piscataway. Former vacant office parks are now vibrant sites of commerce. The old Union Carbide location that sat unused with soil contaminated from chemical manufacturing now houses an extensive center of five logistics facilities on a remediated site.

We are improving our environment, rejuvenating our tax base, creating good, local jobs, and are now able to build our Community Center.

An October 1779 raid by the British Queen's Rangers cavalry unit began at a tavern that was at the corner of Stelton Road & Lakeview Avenue. The Piscataway Historical and Heritage Society will soon put up a historical marker commemorating the Revolutionary War event near an existing Battle of Quibbletown marker at Columbus Park overlooking the falls by the intersection of William Street & New Market Road and near the cannon. ## Our Waterways and Shorelines

This summer enjoy and celebrate our beaches, coastlines and waterways because they belong to you. New Jersey's beaches and waterfronts are some of our state's most precious environmental assets. The right to access and enjoy them is now preserved and honored for all residents.

Historically, public access to these natural resources is protected under the English common law tradition rooted in ancient Roman civil law which holds that these areas are held in trust for the public for the purposes of fishing, commerce and navigation. The public trust doctrine establishes legal rights of the public to access and use tidal waterways and the adjacent shorelines yet it was not included in our state statutes.

Protecting and preserving this public access to waterfronts and beaches was my intent when I introduced beach access legislation years ago. After much work in the legislature and with bipartisan support, the bill (S-1074) passed both houses this past spring and was signed into law by Governor Murphy in May in time for this summer.

Now, it is enshrined in our statutes that it is the right of every resident to enjoy these natural treasures. With the passage of this legislation into law, the Garden State and its shores will remain host to New Jersey residents and its visitors. Recycling/Mini-Dump Center's summertime days & hours

Tuesdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.)

Thursdays – 2 p.m.-8 p.m. (Gates close at 7:45 p.m.)

Saturdays – 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (Gates close at 4:15 p.m.)

The Center is closed on Sundays, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays as well as certain holidays.

Need to dispose of leaves? Grass? Other bagged brush or vegetation? Please make sure to get your "grass disposal coupons" at one coupon per bag. With a minimum purchase of two coupons, they are \$1 each. Checks should be made out to "Township of Piscataway." Grass disposal coupons may be bought at the Tax Collector's office at Town Hall, 455 Hoes Lane, Piscataway, NJ 08854 in person on Mondays through Fridays from 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m.-4:30 p.m. or through the mail by writing to the Tax Collector's office.

Public Works will not pick up leaf bags until the Fall, and residents who leave leaf bags on the curb after receiving a notice to abate may be subject to a fine. However, residents may bring them to the Mini-Dump Center during its summertime hours. Only 2019 coupons may be used in this calendar year. Unbagged vegetation such as branches brought to the Center do not need a grass disposal coupon.

Need to get rid of lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture or other such non-recyclable materials? This is when to use one or more of the four Recycling/Mini-Dump Center coupons you were sent in January in a packet that came with a Recycling Center ID and rules & regulations. When you bring any of these materials to the Center at 505 Sidney Road, you must have at the gate a 2019 coupon and proof of residency, either a driver's license or a Recycling Center ID. A car-load of these materials needs one coupon; a pick-up truck needs two coupons.

Residents entering the Center must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered. The largest vehicle allowed is a half-ton pick-up truck. No commercial vehicles, trucks with side boards, boxed U-Hauls or moving trucks are permitted.

What to do with materials such as batteries, tires, motor oil, certain metal items (washers, dryers, dishwashers, hot water heaters, refrigerators, air conditioners), certain electronics (televisions, desktop or personal computers, computer monitors, portable computers, desktop printers, desktop fax machines) as well as any recyclables usually picked up curbside? You can bring these to the Center and do not need a coupon.

Some items may not be brought to the Center. No paint, hazardous waste, kitchen garbage, contractor debris, dirt, rocks or stones are handled by the Township. The Center will also not accept other electronics such as cell phones, copiers, digital cameras, DVD players, e-book readers, keyboards, MP3 players, modems, mice, personal digital assistants (PDAs), scanners, stereo and radio equipment, telephones, VCRs or any products that contain rechargeable batteries not included in this list. Please contact the Middlesex County Division of Solid Waste Management at (732) 745-4170 for information on how to dispose of such items.

Need a special curbside pick up? Until mid-October, residents may schedule two curbside trash pick ups and one curbside branch pick up. To schedule, please call the Public Works Department at (732) 562-2390 no later than Friday, September 13th.

Please keep in mind that for branches picked up curbside, the bundles must be tied with string and be no wider than one foot in diameter. Crews will not take any branches longer than five feet in length and no wider than four inches in diameter. Any bundles containing construction type wood, metal or other foreign objects will not be taken. Please stack the bundles neatly at the curb, making the pile no longer than ten feet in length, five feet deep and four feet high.
