JANUARY 20 – 2 – 4 p.m. – THE HARLEM HELL FIGHTERS: THE NEW JERSEY CONNECTION

One hundred years ago, during World War I, an infantry regiment of the 15th New York National Guard consisting mainly of African Americans, prepared for deployment in France. Two thousand enlisted men joined its ranks, which included nearly three hundred volunteers from New Jersey, who represented the wide spectrum of New Jersey's communities, such as Ramapough Lenape from northern New Jersey and five volunteer soldiers from Middlesex County. It was the Germans who bestowed the nickname, "Hell Fighters," upon the regiment, due to their well-earned reputation for toughness, and the fact that they never lost a soldier to capture, nor give up a trench or a foot of ground to the enemy!

Richard Sears Walling, a historian specializing in the regiment and producer of *From Harlem to Hell and Back* (available on YouTube), explores the role of New Jersey men in the famed Harlem Hell Fighters of World War I. The program honors our World War I generation and the brave men who fought for democracy and equality.

FEBRUARY 25 – 2 – 4 p.m. (snow date: March 11) – NEW BRUNSWICK AND THE CIVIL WAR: THE BRUNSWICK BOYS IN THE GREAT REBELLION

At the beginning of the Civil War, New Brunswick was positioned at the transportation and manufacturing hub of New Jersey. Many of the city's young men exchanged manufacturing equipment for rifles, and those whom they left behind witnessed the war through letters from their sons, brothers and husbands.

Patriotism, a longing to earn more money and adventure lured these "Brunswick Boys" – close friends and co-workers-to enlist. Their recollections offer insights into everyday life in New Jersey during the war-New Brunswick's factory system, education and medicine. These letters also reveal their struggles to survive amid battles and close encounters with death that so many soldiers faced, as well as their difficult transition back to civilian life.

Local author, Joanne Hamilton Rajoppi, presents the fascinating stories of New Brunswick and the Civil War, gleaned from the letters of those who experienced it. (The History Press)

*Residents will receive Recycling Center/Mini Dump 2018 Coupons & Recycling Center ID Pass Cards in the mail in the next few months. These coupons and pass cards MUST be presented at the gate along with Driver's License as proof of residency. Coupons are required for bagged brush, lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials, in addition to batteries, tires, motor oil, branches, leaves and metal. Coupons are not required for disposal of recyclable materials, including recyclables picked up curbside. The largest vehicle allowed in the Recycling Center is a half-ton pickup truck. No trucks with build up sideboards are allowed. Pickup trucks must surrender two (2) coupons plus an additional coupon for a trailer no larger than 4x8 feet.

*NOT PERMITTED, HAZARDOUS OR TOXIC WASTE, CHEMICALS OR PAINTS, CONTRACTOR DEBRIS, DIRT, CONCRETE OR OTHER ROCK TYPE DEBRIS. **NOTE:** Electronics can be brought to the mini-dump during mini-dump hours. No electronics will be picked up curbside.

*Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pick ups and one (1) brush curbside pick up per calendar year. Call 732-562-2390 to schedule an appointment. The curbside/bulk pick up resumes on Tuesday, January 9, 2018.

***CHRISTMAS TREES** will not be picked up – residents may bring them to your local firehouse only during the month of January or they can be brought to the Recycling Center during winter hours. Trees must be devoid of all decorations – trees will be recycled.

LANDLORD REGISTRATION REMINDER:

Every landlord in the Township of Piscataway shall make application for, and file with the Rental Housing Officer, a Landlord Registration Statement for every building containing one (1) or more dwelling units occupied by one (1) or more tenants. Thereafter, an application to renew the Landlord Registration Statement shall be filed annually each March 1. Congratulations to Peter Namen, Piscataway Community Television's (PCTV) professional videographer for being awarded the Thomas Barton Post Historic Preservation Award in the government category by the Metlar/Bodine House Museum. On Thursday, January 25th, the **Piscataway Historical and Heritage Society** will present historian Gordon Bond who will speak about Thomas Mundy Peterson. Mr. Peterson was the first black man to vote under the 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution on March 31, 1870. This significant event took place in Perth Amboy after which Mr. Peterson was involved in local and state politics for a period of years. The program will be held in the Senior Citizens Center at 7:30 p.m. All residents are invited to attend – light refreshments will be served.

On Thursday, March 22nd, there will be a general meeting of the H&H Society at 7:30 p.m. at the Cornelius Low House on River Road. The current exhibit is "Over There, Over Here, New Jersey in WWI". SENATOR BOB SMITH REVOLUTIONIZING FOOD WASTE

As chairman of the Environment and Energy committee, the most interesting committee in the State Legislature, we're working very hard to keep the Garden State moving forward in producing clean energy, keeping our environment green and helping food insecure families. Last year I introduced a package of bills that would revolutionize the way New Jersey handles its food waste. The average person doesn't give much thought to the food that they scrape off their plates and into the garbage at the end of a meal. Those scraps make their way to landfills. This biomass breaks down in the landfill where it then converts to methane gas, which is a potent greenhouse gas that contributes to global climate change. In addition, food that is wholesome and uneaten should be available to food insecure families.

That is why I authored a bill that encourages composting and building more food-waste-to-energy facilities in New Jersey requiring large generators of food waste to separate and recycle that food waste with the aim of converting it into energy. We have a problem with waste in this country, and recycling solid waste is a viable system that will produce energy to provide to our homes, schools and businesses. The EPA reports that if half of food waste could be properly recycled and used as fuel for energy, it would produce enough electricity to power 2.5 million homes for a year. Rutgers University's Agricultural Experimental Station also suggested in a study last year that New Jersey is not utilizing the potential energy from biomass. This measure would not only work to curb the production of greenhouse gas emissions, it could reduce the dependency we have on fossil fuels while also improving our air quality.

As much as 40 percent of the food in the U.S. is uneaten. It's a tragedy socially because there are so many hungry people in our country with an estimated 42 million Americans living in food-insecure households. It's also a problem environmentally because so much of that waste ends up in landfills. This work we are doing in the legislature is an intelligent alternative to improve our environment and help feed the hungry.
