**I**f you've driven down Hoes Lane, you've seen gates around a field just south of the Kennedy Library. When you drive by this area in the Summer of 2020, you'll see our wonderful new Community Center bursting with activity and family fun.

An aquatic center with three pools. A full-size basketball court with an overhead running track. A fitness center with modern exercise machines. Dance and art studios, a youth activity room and a community room. Men's, women's and family locker rooms. A café and a large space for group meetings. This is our Community Center.


Piscataway residents have been incredibly patient. The singular reason we can build the Community Center is because we now have the funds as a result of the Township Council

and I rejuvenating our tax base with state-of-the-art warehousing and other new companies. We attracted these businesses to move into Piscataway by recognizing the changes in the regional and national economy from office parks to clean fulfillment centers. These new companies are already providing good paying jobs for hard working residents as well as revenue for this and other important projects.

For the Community Center, Terminal Construction Corporation was hired as our general contractor in December 2018. The construction management Cumming Corporation and Netta Architects were earlier brought on board.

Around the time of our upcoming groundbreaking our contractor will be laying the foundation and carving out the pool shells. Around May we plan for crews to start putting up the structural steel. Quite a few months of work on the building façade is slated to start in July while simultaneous, lengthy efforts of interior framing and drywall are scheduled to begin in September. Throughout the winter and extending into next spring and early summer, crews will be working in the interior, installing gym equipment and getting it ready to open.

I hope you can join us for our groundbreaking ceremony and I look forward to enjoying our Community Center with you.



## Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, fire extinguishers

Under a new state law, "Ten year sealed battery-powered single station smoke alarms shall be installed..." in a residence at the time of resale or rental. However, "A/C-powered single or multiple-station smoke alarms installed as part of the original construction or rehabilitation project shall not be replaced with battery powered smoke alarms."

In addition, at least one carbon monoxide detector is required in each residence, specifically, one on each floor and within ten feet of each bedroom.

Also, every residence must have a fire extinguisher in or within 10 feet of the kitchen. It can't be behind a door or in a cabinet. It can't be mounted higher than five feet. Make sure the instructions are visible, it is no larger than ten pounds and has a minimum rating of "2A:10BC."

Recycling & Mini Dump (Trash Center) passes and coupons have been mailed to all residential property owners. A coupon must be presented at the gate along with a driver's license as proof of Township residency. Rules and hours were enclosed in the mailing.

Coupons are required for grass disposal and may be purchased in the Tax Office in Town Hall starting Monday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, 8:30 a.m.-12:20 p.m. & 1:30-4:30 p.m., and are good for the current year only. Cost: \$1 (minimum purchase) for two coupons. The Recycling Center will accept bagged grass with coupons starting Tuesday, April 2<sup>nd</sup>.

Coupons are also required for lumber, household debris, carpeting, furniture and all other non-recyclable materials. Residents need not provide coupons for recyclable materials such as batteries, tires (maximum two per trip), motor oil, branches, leaves, metal, various plastics and glass, cardboard and paper. Brush may be brought to the Mini Dump but may not be longer than five (5) feet in length or greater than four (4) inches in diameter.

Not permitted are kitchen garbage, hazardous or toxic waste, chemicals, paints, contractor debris, dirt, concrete or any other type of rock debris.

Electronic devices covered by the NJ Electronic Waste Management Act includes televisions, desktop & personal computers, monitors, printers and fax machines. They may be brought to the Recycling Center during hours of operation. Electronics will not be picked up curbside.

### Hazardous materials

Residents are encouraged to recycle hazardous household materials and paint at Middlesex County's designated locations at announced dates & times. Piscataway Township does not accept any hazardous waste, toxic waste materials, chemicals or paints at its Recycling Center & Mini Dump.

### Bulk pick-ups

Residents may schedule two (2) bulk trash curbside pickups and one (1) brush curbside pickup per calendar year by calling (732) 562-2390 for an appointment. The last appointments can be made in mid-September and the program ends in the second week of October. During the summer months there may be a six to eight week wait. Branches must be bundled and tied. No bagged brush is allowed.

### Arriving

All residents entering the Mini Dump must have their vehicles properly insured, inspected and registered in Piscataway. No trucks larger than half-ton pickups and no trucks with sideboards are allowed. Pickup trucks and full size vans are required to provide two (2) coupons per visit.

Parking is available in the visitor lot facing Sidney Road. Please enter through the building's main entrance.

### Be mindful of what you flush

The Piscataway sewer system is designed to flow from your home through the Township owned sewer lines to the treatment plant in Sayreville. In some areas, due to the topography, flow has to go uphill and must be assisted by lift stations known as pump stations. At this point, certain elements have to be excluded as the pumps can get jammed by materials such as fabrics, both woven and non-woven. Other types of products include baby wipes, chemically treated wipes, sanitary napkins and most paper towels. Although many manufacturers of these products list them as flushable, in reality, they are not. We ask that you dispose of these non-flushable materials via your regular garbage collection for deposit at a landfill. By complying, you will reduce the possibility of you having a plumbing company rectify a sewer blockage at an estimated cost of \$125 per hour.

# Open Space Funding to Increase in Fiscal Year 2020

As Chairman of the Senate Environment and Energy Committee, I have long been considered a steward of the environment here in the Garden State and have worked, on behalf of our residents, writing some of the strongest laws protecting our state's natural resources. To me, this is a great responsibility and the work that I do with the New Jersey Legislature to ensure clean air, clean water and preserved land is for our future generations.

Most recently my legislation, Senate Bill 2920, which has bi-partisan support was voted out of the Senate Environment Committee unanimously and is advancing through the legislative process. This measure establishes funding for constitutionally dedicated Corporate Business Tax (CBT) revenues for the State's open space, farmland, and historic preservation programs for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 and thereafter.

Starting in FY2020, the constitutionally dedicated CBT revenues for open space would be allocated as follows: 62% would go towards the acquisition and development of lands for public recreation and conservation purposes, 31% for farmland preservation purposes and 7% for historic preservation purposes. Under Green Acres, local governments would be able to apply for grants to be used for open space acquisition and recreational development. However, the majority of the funds would go towards State open space acquisition and development projects. The open space funding can also be used for Blue Acres projects – a willing seller program that buys flood-prone land that buffers or protects other lands from storm damage.

Dedicating the CBT monies for preservation is a winner for us taxpayers because both our open spaces and natural resources are being protected without any new debt. New Jersey is the most densely populated state in the country, so the preservation of open space and farmland is extremely important if we are going to prevent overdevelopment and preserve our history. A stable source of funding is imperative. This has been a long time coming and over the years this program has become even more essential as climate change is causing "100 year storms" to occur at more regular intervals. This stable source of funding has been the Holy Grail of the environmental movement in New Jersey for over a half century and is a major change in how we do preservation in our state.
